Came on boat which landed here in 1863
The town was then very small but promising
There were already a few furnaces. Kilns & sawmill
We went to live on W. Washington st. where we staid
until the big fire burned us out in 18—
There was but 1 house on Ridge. The rest of that
part of town was but a hill of trees.
The only road out of the city was a rough
muddy road to Bancroft. (Bancroft + Forresville)
At Forresville was a Big Iron Smelter. This
Big Iron when sold brot \$3.00 a Ton

There were no Engines here at first & transportation was carried on with mule cars. These ~~at~~ cars would get away going down hill & kill the mules sometimes people.

Charcoal burning was done at Collinville this industry tho primitive in methods was one of the most important. - powder was made from this pine charcoal

The mining was all done on the surface and the process resembled ordinary ditch digging.

There was little or no transportation alet to these mines. but people in those days took nothing of walking up there & back from Marquette.
