When at the age of 14 Iran away from my
New York home to join some boy comrades
who had with their families gone to Marquette.
Marquette was nothing but a wild settlement
when I reached and was very tough. But the
sprople were kind hearted & gave me much
sympathy. They found me my friends and they
found me employment working for the
powder mill This was very interesting work
(making char coal.) Altho their were no large
railroads commingents here the town increased

in population very rapedly. They came in sail boats across the lake. I staid with the Dupon people for 25 yro. and when I resigned was head powder maker. Ithen bought a salvon went into buisiness. The people in those days were generally quick to drink but slow to pay. Hou ever Imadé good at et. The country here has changed very much especialy the forest which has no large træsleft tvery lettle game. The first people were mostly canadians or New Gorkers.
